- (8) I have enough firewood for Africa.
- (9) I would start growing vegetables immediately.
- (10) I would barter for a small amount of milk and some tea or tea substitute each day with something such as firewood or advice or support '101' Economics would still apply even with barter.
- (11) Cooking outside all the time would be a pain some days, but it would be workable.
- (12) With no power, I would go to bed early but get up early.
- (13) My present wardrobe of clothes would last ten years if they had to.
- (14) I would not miss television or the internet.
- (15) I would need a bicycle, a fishing rod, an axe and a flint – all of which I have in the garage already.
- (16) I could cope with dropping my standard of living.
- (17) I would take my 20 chickens and one rooster – my engineering ability would help in several areas.
